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Message from the Chair

Dear Members,

This year has shown us the true power of *Connection in Action*. Together, we strengthened team-based care, expanded partnerships, and took bold steps toward a future where family physicians and our population's health thrive. This impact report reminds us that our greatest strength is each other.

The opening of the expanded PCN Allied Health Centre in May was a milestone years in the making. By expanding sustainable team-based care, the Centre relieves family physicians of significant non-medical burdens and enhances patient care. Members tell us they can no longer imagine practicing without this support. The space also became the new home of the Division office. It is a shining example of physician-led innovation made possible through collaboration with long-standing and new partners.

This achievement highlights what is possible when we widen our circles—and it is only the beginning. In today's challenging environment, the Board has directed staff to explore additional partnerships and funding so physician-led innovation can continue to flourish.

A strong physician community remains at the heart of Division impact. Our survey confirmed what many of you have shared: belonging and practical supports are essential to well-being and creativity. This year, we grew our community by 11%, expanded locum support, and created more opportunities to connect and engage. These additions strengthen both resilience and our collective voice as family physicians in Victoria.

We also advanced supports for vulnerable patients. The PCN surpassed 11,000 patient attachments. Our Long-term Care Initiative expanded with new physicians. A pilot ER protocol for opioid-using patients reduced "left without being seen" rates. Stronger engagement with specialists is fostering collegiality, while new referral resources ease care transitions.

The Division's new strategic plan, released in June 2025, guides us toward our refreshed vision of a community where family physicians thrive and lead excellent care for all. For the first time, the plan embeds a commitment to advancing Indigenous cultural competency and safety. Indigenous partners also played a vital role in the culturally informed design of the Allied Health Centre, and we are committed to deepening these relationships.

This year's achievements would not be possible without you, our members. Thank you for your dedication. I extend my gratitude to the staff, Executive Director, and our partners for their pivotal support and collaboration.

It has been a privilege to serve as Chair during this critical time. I look forward to seeing the Division's impact grow even stronger in the years ahead.


Most importantly, thank you to you, our members, for your dedication to your patients, to one another, and to your Division. It is a true honour to work alongside you in shaping primary care improvements.



Small 'a' advocacy





New: Embedded Commitment to Indigenous Cultural Safety and Competency

As an organization, we are deepening our practice of Indigenous cultural awareness, sensitivity, competency, and humility, recognizing that these are not endpoints, but part of an ongoing journey. This work is grounded in relationships, accountability, and respect for First Nations, Métis, and Inuit self-determination. We recognize that culturally safe care and engagement is defined by Indigenous Peoples.


We are working to embed this commitment across all areas of our organization—programs, policies, leadership, partnerships, and team culture—so it becomes a way of working, not a siloed effort.

When Indigenous Cultural Competency is woven throughout our values, it looks like:

 Collaboration – Aiming to engage early and meaningfully with local Indigenous Peoples, building authentic relationships rather than treating engagement as a checkbox.

Innovation – Honouring Indigenous ways of knowing and being as vital to creative problem-solving and systems change.

As language and understanding continue to evolve, we recognize that terms such as *cultural safety, cultural awareness, cultural sensitivity, cultural competency, cultural humility, reconciliation, two-eyed seeing,* and *decolonization* reflect an ongoing journey. We will continue to learn and adapt in dialogue and relationship with Indigenous partners, patients and clients, physicians, communities, Elders, and Knowledge Keepers.



Deepening relationships with our Indigenous communities

In alignment with our commitment to Indigenous Cultural Safety and Competency, we continue to learn and adapt through dialogue and relationship-building with Indigenous partners, patients, physicians, communities, Elders, and Knowledge Keepers. These moments are part of an ongoing journey, alongside many others woven throughout this report.

 Guidance from the Indigenous Circle – Founded in 2024, the 16-member Circle now meets monthly to share knowledge, guide Indigenous patient care and the Indigenous Learning Journey, and offer its lens to the PCN work.

• **Listening and learning on the land** – On-reserve visits by our Chair and Executive Director with Elders of local Nations opened space to explore areas of mutual interest.

- **Cultural teachings at the pit cook** During a traditional pit cook guided by a Knowledge Holder, physicians, clinicians, and staff deeply appreciated hands-on cultural teachings rooted in the traditional foodways of the Coastal First Peoples.
- **Two-Eyed Seeing at the AGM** Len Pierre delivered a powerful keynote, and we were honoured to welcome Indigenous vendors, artists, Elders, and Knowledge Keepers at the gathering.

 Designing spaces with care – The Aunty Collective and local Elders and Knowledge Keepers have provided valuable insights and support for culturally safe clinic design, ceremonies, and healing artwork for our PCN Allied Health Centre.



Expanded PCN Allied Health Centre a Game-Changer for Team-Based Care

Dreams became reality in spring 2025 with the opening of our new Division office and expanded Primary Care Network Allied Health Centre, announced on-site by Health Minister Josie Osborne at a provincial media event. At 6,500 square feet, this purpose-built space is transforming how our PCN cohorts deliver sustainable team-based care.

It is designed to attract and retain allied health professionals, ensuring long-term capacity across our PCN's clinics. Planned in consultation with Indigenous community partners, the design considers culturally sensitive care. The space also serves as a hub for Board, working group, and physician meetings, bringing clinicians and Division staff together under one roof.

This milestone is a testament to grassroots physician leadership at the Victoria Division of Family Practice and the power of collaboration, made possible with Island Health, the Ministry of Health, Mayor Alto and the City of Victoria, Indigenous partners, and Jawl Residential, the building architects and managers. We are deeply grateful to










More Supports for Everyday Practice

Making specialist referrals flow smoothly

We're building stronger connections between family physicians and specialists, fostering trust, shared understanding, and practical solutions that help referrals move effortlessly and keep care journeys seamless.



New resources turn challenges into solutions

Ideas from our packed fall 2024 specialist engagement event inspired a suite of highimpact resources in 2025:

Support for vulnerable populations

Helping opioid-using patients stay for care

The Acute Opioid Withdrawal Protocol is making a measurable difference, helping more patients remain in the ED to receive the care they need. This high-dose order set equips frontline staff to provide timely, appropriate care for people in withdrawal who agree to the process, even when they arrive for unrelated concerns.

At RJH's ED, only 2% of 361 encounters using the order set resulted in patients leaving without seeing a physician (LWBS), compared to a 7.8% overall rate across Island Health EDs.

In addition, 40% of 125 substance-using ED patients without a case manager could be connected to one through the substance use nurse (SUN). Added to the ED team in September 2024, the SUN sees substance-using patients as soon as possible upon arrival in the ED.

Strategizing on these insights, the LTCI is setting the stage for lasting improvements in care experiences of one of our most vulnerable populations.






Opening a new pathway to cancer screening

At CanScreen, Drs. Stuart Bax and Cal Shapiro offer critical cancer screening to unattached patients, closing care gaps and saving lives. The Division stepped in as fund holder to secure initial Shared Care support in 2023 and helped promote the clinic's new model of care to local interest holders and primary care clinics. We have since linked CanScreen to the Victoria PCN to support future membership and sustainability.

Backing clinics through transition and growth

When Tuscany Family Medicine had to relocate due to an unexpected lease change, the Division quickly connected them with potential spaces and supported a successful Doctors of BC minor tenant improvement funding application. Today, the clinic thrives in its permanent home, has welcomed a PRA-BC international graduate and a PCN RN, and actively participates in the PCN and Urban Locum Program.

A warm welcome for international physicians

Recruitment through our IslandDocs.com collaborative and the Ministry of Health's U.S. campaign is yielding strong results. The Division has been by the side of interested physicians every step of the way, offering personalized clinic matchmaking tours, comprehensive one-on-one onboarding, and a warm welcome to our physician community.

the practiceready pathway

Victoria proudly welcomed three new family physicians this year through the Practice-Ready Assessment BC (PRA-BC) program, a vital gateway for International Medical Graduates (IMGs) to gain licensure and put down roots here.

Our strengthened collaboration with PRA-BC has inspired more local clinics to become host sites, further opening this pathway and enriching our community capacity.
